Project Title: Lind Marine Dry Dock Project (California Endangered Species Act (CESA) Incidental Take Permit No. 2081-2020-024-03, Amendment No. 1 (ITP))

Project Location: The Lind Marine Dry Dock Project (Project) is located at Dry Dock 4 of the Mare Island Dry Docks and the Mare Island Strait immediately east of Dry Dock 4, at 1250 Nimitz Avenue, just west of the City of Vallejo in an unincorporated area of Solano County. The Project is located approximately 1.28 miles south of the eastern terminus of the Mare Island Causeway, which connects the City of Vallejo to Mare Island, at Latitude 38.09446°N, Longitude 122.2636°W. The Project site is bounded by Mare Island Strait and Mare Island Way to the east and north, and the Lind Marine building, associated facilities, and Nimitz Avenue to the south and west. Specifically, the Project occurs within and in front of Dry Dock 4 and along Berth 16 and a portion of Berth 15.

Project Description: The Project includes ongoing operation of Dry Dock 4 and maintenance dredging over a 10-year period. The purpose of the Project is to continue to provide a ship repair and dismantling facility at the Mare Island Dry Docks. Up to 24 evolutions (i.e., filling the dry dock with water from Mare Island Strait, opening the caisson, allowing a ship to enter or exit the dock, and then draining the dock and performing fish rescue and relocation activities) will be performed in Dry Dock 4 each year. Additionally, up to 40,000 cubic yards of sediment will be removed from an approximately 3.89-acre area in the Mare Island Strait each year via a mechanical (i.e., clamshell) dredger.


Amendment No. 1 adds white sturgeon (*Acipenser transmontanus*) as a Covered Species to the ITP. Amendment No. 1 will not result in additional take of the originally Covered Species. Take of white sturgeon in the form of mortality is not anticipated to occur as a result of the Project, rather, take is anticipated in the form of pursue, catch, and capture from fish rescue and relocation activities pursuant to the *Mare Island Dry Dock Fish Rescue and Relocation Plan, Revised, Mare Island, Solano County*, prepared by WRA, Inc., revised May 20, 2014, April 10, 2020, and August 25, 2025

Notice of Determination**- 2 -**

The Project is expected to result in incidental take of up to 909 individuals of longfin smelt (*Spirinchus thaleichthys*), and a smaller number of Delta smelt (*Hypomesus transpacificus*), winter-run Chinook salmon (*Oncorhynchus tshawytscha*), and spring-run Chinook salmon (*Oncorhynchus tshawytscha*). Longfin smelt and spring-run Chinook salmon are designated as threatened species under CESA. Delta smelt and winter-run Chinook salmon are designated as an endangered species under CESA. The ITP referenced above as issued by CDFW authorizes incidental take of species listed under CESA that may occur as a result of Project implementation.
