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# 1. INTRODUCTION AND LIST OF COMMENTERS

## 1.1 INTRODUCTION

This Final Environmental Impact Report (EIR) contains comments received during the public review period of the Lippi Ranch Subdivision Project (proposed project) Draft EIR. This document has been prepared by the City of Galt, as Lead Agency, in accordance with the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the CEQA Guidelines, Section 15132. The Introduction and List of Commenters chapter of the Final EIR discusses the background of the Draft EIR and purpose of the Final EIR, and provides an overview of the organization of the Final EIR.

## 1.2 BACKGROUND

The Draft EIR identifies the proposed project's potential impacts and the mitigation measures that would be required to be implemented. The Lippi Ranch Subdivision Project Draft EIR includes a Cultural and Historic Resources chapter. The remaining environmental issue areas identified by Appendix G of the CEQA Guidelines are addressed in the Initial Study prepared for the proposed project, which is included as Appendix A of the Lippi Ranch Subdivision Project Draft EIR.

In accordance with CEQA, the City of Galt used the following methods to solicit public input on the Draft EIR:

- A Notice of Preparation (NOP) for the Draft EIR was released for a 30-day public review period from March 22, 2023 to April 20, 2023. The NOP comment letters are included as Appendix B to the Draft EIR.
- A public scoping meeting was held on April 13, 2023 to solicit comments regarding the scope of the Draft EIR.
- On August 24, 2023, the Draft EIR was submitted to the State Clearinghouse for distribution to State agencies for a 45-day public review period from August 24, 2023 to October 9, 2023.
- On August 24, 2023, a Notice of Availability (NOA) and the Draft EIR was posted to the City's website and the Sacramento County Clerk's Office (600 8<sup>th</sup> Street, Sacramento, CA 95814), and mailed to local agencies and interested members of the public.
- The Draft EIR was made available for review on the City's website at: <https://www.cityofgalt.org/government/community-development/planning/development-projects-environmental-documents>.
- A public meeting was held before the Planning Commission on September 14, 2023 to solicit public comments regarding the Draft EIR.

All public comments received on the Draft EIR are listed in this chapter, and written responses to comments are included in Chapter 2, Response to Comments, as discussed in more detail in Section 1.4 of this chapter.



### 1.3 PURPOSE OF THE FINAL EIR

Pursuant to CEQA Guidelines Section 15132, this Final EIR consists of the following:

1. A list of persons, organizations, and public agencies commenting on the Draft EIR (included as Section 1.4 of this chapter);
2. Comments received on the Draft EIR (Chapter 2 of this Final EIR);
3. Responses to all comments received on the Draft EIR (Chapter 2 of this Final EIR);
4. A Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (Chapter 3 of this Final EIR); and
5. Any other information added by the Lead Agency.

Comments received on the Draft EIR did not necessitate changes to the Draft EIR; thus, a Revisions to the Draft EIR Text Chapter is not required for this Final EIR.

### 1.4 LIST OF COMMENTERS

The City of Galt received one comment letter during the public comment period on the Draft EIR for the proposed project. The comment letter was authored by the following agency. Verbal comments were not received at the public meeting held before the Planning Commission.

### 1.5 CERTIFICATION OF THE FINAL EIR

State law requires that the City make several types of CEQA “findings” at the time of final action on the project. Findings describe the conclusions reached regarding particular issues, including specific evidence in support of those conclusions. The Final EIR typically provides much of the substantial evidence to support these findings. The required findings for the project are as follows:

- Certification of the Final EIR (CEQA Guidelines Section 15090) – These findings support the adequacy of the Final EIR for decision-making purposes. The Lead Agency must make the following three determinations in certifying a Final EIR:
  1. The Final EIR has been completed in compliance with CEQA.
  2. The Final EIR was presented to the decision-making body of the Lead Agency, and the decision-making body reviewed and considered the information in the Final EIR prior to approving the project.
  3. The Final EIR reflects the Lead Agency’s independent judgment and analysis.
- Findings Regarding Significant Impacts and Project Alternatives (CEQA Guidelines Section 15091) – These findings explain how the City chose to address each identified significant impact, including the mitigation measures adopted or an explanation of why such measures are infeasible. A discussion of the feasibility of project alternatives is also required by this section (see also CEQA Guidelines Section 15126.6[f]).

Pursuant to CEQA Guidelines, Section 15093(b), when a Lead Agency approves a project that would result in significant unavoidable impacts, the agency must state in writing the reasons supporting the action (Statement of Overriding Considerations). The Statement of Overriding Considerations shall be supported by substantial evidence. The Lippi Ranch Subdivision Project would result in significant and unavoidable impacts related to cultural and historic resources; thus,



a Statement of Overriding Considerations must be adopted if the project is approved. The required Findings of Fact and Statement of Overriding Considerations will be included as part of the resolution considered by the City of Galt.

## **1.6 ORGANIZATION OF THE FINAL EIR**

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The Final EIR is organized into the following three chapters.

### **1. Introduction and List of Commenters**

Chapter 1 provides an introduction and overview of the document, describes the background of the Draft EIR and the purposes of the Final EIR, provides a list of commenters, and describes the organization of the Final EIR.

Chapter 2 presents the comment letter received, and responses to the comments within the letter. The comment letter received has been numbered at the top and bracketed to indicate how the letter was divided into individual comments. Each comment is given a number with the letter number appearing first, followed by the comment number. For example, the first comment in Letter 1 would have the following format: 1-1. The response to each comment will reference the comment number.

### **3. Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program**

CEQA Guidelines, Section 15097, requires lead agencies to adopt a program for monitoring the mitigation measures required to avoid the significant environmental impacts of a project. The intent of the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) is to ensure implementation of the mitigation measures identified within the EIR and Initial Study (IS) for the Lippi Ranch Subdivision Project.

Thank you for including the California Department of Transportation (Caltrans) in the review process for the project referenced above. We reviewed this local development for impacts to the State Highway System (SHS) in keeping with our mission, vision, and goals, some of which includes addressing equity, climate change, and safety, as outlined in our statewide plans such as the California Transportation Plan, Caltrans Strategic Plan, and Climate Action Plan for Transportation Infrastructure.

The 8.99-acre project site is located on east of Freedom Boulevard/2nd Street at the terminus of 3rd Street, and west of the Union Pacific Railroad tracks in the City of Galt, California. The northern portion of the project site is currently developed with two single-family residences, an apartment building, a barn, and a groundwater pumphouse; the remainder of the project site is undeveloped with fallow agricultural land and limited trees. The proposed project would include demolition of all existing on-site structures, removal of trees, and subsequent development of 94 single-family residences ranging in size from 1,494 square feet to 1,826 square feet, five bio-retention basins, landscaping, and an internal circulation network. Site access would be provided by a new, landscaped roundabout located at the terminus of 3rd Street. Based on the Draft Environmental Impact Report (DEIR), Caltrans provides the following comments:

**Freeway Operations**

The proposed project would develop 94 units of single-family housing on the project site. It is anticipated most of this project's freeway trip generation would use the A Street and C Street/SR 99 interchanges. The recent access control study on SR 99 has determined that these locations have safety deficiency since their collision rates are

significantly higher than the statewide average. Caltrans is planning to extend existing auxiliary lane from A St to Ayers Ln/Pringle Ave on both directions of SR 99 to mitigate the safety impact. It is recommended this project should contribute its proportional share to this auxiliary lane project to mitigate its traffic impact.

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## **LETTER 1: CALIFORNIA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION**

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### **Response to Comment 1-1**

The comment is an introductory statement and does not address the adequacy of the Draft EIR.

### **Response to Comment 1-2**

The relevant question under CEQA is whether the project would substantially increase hazards due to a geometric design feature (e.g., sharp curves or dangerous intersections) or incompatible uses (e.g., farm equipment).

The proposed project would not include any physical changes to the existing roadway system in the project vicinity (e.g., introduction of a new sharp curve or dangerous intersection) that would result in any new hazards. As discussed on page 90 of the Initial Study prepared for the proposed project (see Appendix A of the Draft EIR), primary site access would be provided by a landscaped roundabout located at the terminus of 3<sup>rd</sup> Street, which would then connect to Amadeo Circle, an internal roadway which would be constructed through the project site to provide access to the residential units. The proposed on-site circulation improvements that would be constructed as part of the proposed project would be subject to compliance with all applicable roadway design standards. As such, the Initial Study concluded that the proposed project would not alter the existing transportation network nor increase hazards due to a geometrical design feature. Accordingly, the project would not result in a traffic impact pursuant to CEQA and, thus, no nexus exists to require mitigation regarding operational traffic associated with the proposed project.

Any deficiencies at the State Route (SR) 99 interchanges, as noted in the letter, are existing conditions. In addition, the letter does not provide sufficient data to demonstrate whether additional project-related trips using the SR 99 interchanges would directly result in a substantial increase in hazards at those interchanges.

Furthermore, the noted improvement has not been identified within any Sacramento Area Council of Governments (SACOG) transportation improvement or funding program. As such, a funding mechanism is not in place for projects to pay their fair share towards the noted improvement. Moreover, a fair share amount for the noted improvement has not been established for projects within the City, including the proposed project.

Further coordination between the City and Caltrans, and potentially SACOG, would be required prior to any project within the City being required to make payment towards the noted improvements.

### **Response to Comment 1-3**

The comment is a conclusionary statement and does not address the adequacy of the Draft EIR.



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## **3. Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program**

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## 3. MITIGATION MONITORING AND REPORTING PROGRAM

### 3.1 INTRODUCTION

Section 15097 of the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) requires all State and local agencies to establish monitoring or reporting programs for projects approved by a public agency whenever approval involves the adoption of either a “mitigated negative declaration” or specified environmental findings related to an EIR.

The following is the Mitigation Monitoring and Reporting Program (MMRP) for the Lippi Ranch Subdivision Project (proposed project). The intent of the MMRP is to ensure implementation of the mitigation measures identified within the EIR and Initial Study (IS) for the proposed project. Unless otherwise noted, the cost of implementing the mitigation measures as prescribed by this MMRP shall be funded by the project applicant.

### 3.2 COMPLIANCE CHECKLIST

The MMRP contained herein is intended to satisfy the requirements of CEQA as they relate to the EIR for the Lippi Ranch Subdivision Project prepared by the City of Galt. This MMRP is intended to be used by City staff and mitigation monitoring personnel to ensure compliance with mitigation measures during project implementation. Mitigation measures identified in this MMRP were developed in the EIR and IS that were prepared for the proposed project.

The Lippi Ranch Subdivision Project EIR and IS present a detailed set of mitigation measures that will be implemented throughout the lifetime of the project. Mitigation is defined by CEQA Guidelines, Section 15370, as a measure that:

- Avoids the impact altogether by not taking a certain action or parts of an action;
- Minimizes impacts by limiting the degree or magnitude of the action and its implementation;
- Rectifies the impact by repairing, rehabilitating, or restoring the impacted environment;
- Reduces or eliminates the impact over time by preservation and maintenance operations during the life of the project; or
- Compensates for the impact by replacing or providing substitute resources or environments.

The intent of the MMRP is to ensure the implementation of adopted mitigation measures. The MMRP will provide for monitoring of construction activities as necessary and in-the-field identification and resolution of environmental concerns.

Monitoring and documenting the implementation of mitigation measures will be coordinated by the City of Galt. The table in Section 3.3 identifies the mitigation measure, the monitoring action for the mitigation measure, the responsible party for the monitoring action, and timing of the monitoring action. The applicant will be responsible for fully understanding and effectively implementing the mitigation measures contained within the MMRP. The City will be responsible for monitoring compliance.
