Dear Mr. Costillas.

The City of Palo Alto is preparing an Initial Study for the proposed Fiber to the Premises Project (Project). The Project involves the construction of a fiberoptic backbone and fiber-to-the-premises (FTTP) infrastructure in Palo Alto to provide communication services to both residential and commercial properties throughout the city. Key components include the installation of approximately 194.46 miles of fiberoptic cables, with a mix of underground and aerial installations, the establishment of two local aggregation sites, the placement of up to 4.200 underground utility vaults and 147 aboveground utility cabinets, and direct connections to subscribers who opt for fiber internet services. The fiberoptic cables, vaults, and cabinets would be located within existing public rights-of-way or easements, generally within shallow excavations made in paved roadways, sidewalks, and adjacent to buildings, though short segments of cable would cross open space areas in the far western area of Palo Alto. The Project is subject to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and the City of Palo Alto is the CEQA lead agency.

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


















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


Fig 2 Project
