Water Quality Degradation: Concerns that construction activities and post-construction impervious surfaces could lead to increased runoff containing sediments, contaminants (e.g., oils, chemicals, fertilizers), or excess nutrients. Such runoff could directly enter nearby creeks and ultimately Clear Lake, degrading water quality essential for the Hitch and other aquatic life.

Impacts to Hitch Habitat and Spawning: Specific worries that changes in water quality or quantity due to runoff could disrupt the Hitch's spawning migrations in tributary creeks or impact their habitat within Clear Lake itself. The public is keenly aware of the Hitch's reliance on healthy waterways for its life cycle.
