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Project Title: PL23094103 – U.S. Army Corps of Engineers (USACE) Public Law 84-99 Emergency Repair of Yolo Bypass, Reclamation District 1600, 0827, 0785, and 0537 – SacYolo North Levee System Site 0941-03

Project Location: Site 0941-03 is located about 4 miles east of the City of Woodland, bordering the Sacramento River and Yolo Bypass. (start: 38.714717, -121.6354; end 38.714317, -121.635492), in Yolo County.

Project Description: To restore the site to pre-flood conditions, the recommended repair work consists of removing and disposing all existing rock in the affected area, excavating to a slope of 1H:1V, and reconstructing to a 2.5H:1V slope with appropriate levee fill material. A 4 feet deep, 18 feet wide keyway was added for increased stability against sliding. Material was benched into the existing in order to provide a good interface. Localized dewatering was necessary for construction given the proximity to the landside irrigation ditch. Existing power poles were relocated for construction.

Reasons Why Project is Exempt:

A state of emergency was proclaimed to exist throughout California by Governor Newsom on January 4, 2023, due to atmospheric storms that swept across California beginning in late December 2022. On March 1, March 8, March 12, March 14, and March 28, 2023, the Governor issued additional proclamations to include 47 counties to the state of emergency due to storms beginning in late February 2023. On April 20, 2023, the Governor issued a sixth Proclamation of a State of Emergency ordering the provisions of the previous State of Emergency Proclamations apply to an additional four counties, including Yolo County. The project is statutorily exempt from CEQA pursuant to Public Resources Code Section 15269 (a), Emergency Projects, because the project involves repair work to flood damaged levees in disaster-stricken areas caused by the storm events in which the state of emergency was proclaimed.
